## April 2022 Newsletter

Dear Thirsty 13th members, relatives, and friends,

The March 1, 2022, newsletter summarized findings from the February NY and MA scanning visits. I showed photos from Mullin at one of two New Caledonia award ceremonies. Since 2011, I have wanted to make those more exact and tried from February 28 to March 8. On 9/14/20, the son, John, of one of our 13 original navigators, Joseph Block, emailed me "I came upon a few pics from the Thirsty 13<sup>th</sup>. Hoping you haven't seen these yet." One was the only front photo of the 8/2/43 ceremony. This was key, and John is the only one who has this.

In February, while looking for a photo of Gornbein, I was surprised to find the daughter of McDonough. She emailed scans of 7 photos, including two great ones of a King Neptune ceremony, four of her dad and one with Irwin Cohen. She mailed me the originals to scan here, and included 2 orders, and both had Abramowitz. He and Cohen were in the last newsletter.

On October 13, 2021, the daughter, Joann, of one of our radar mechanics, Gunderson, mailed me a letter and noted she found her dad's 1945 diary which she had never seen before. She made copies and mailed these to me 2/7/22, and on 3/2/22 emailed me color scans. Her dad had chapel programs I had never seen. These items provided great additional insights into life at Biak.

1. Additional History

a. 1943: Two 1943 Award Ceremonies

AWARD OF THE DISTINGUISHED FLYING CROSS:

The book on page 332 notes from July 16-21, 1943, the USAF in the S Pacific Area issued General Orders ("GO") #182, above right, and 183. These awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal, and Oak Leaf Clusters (OLCs) to our first overseas air crew members, who flew missions to Guadalcanal. The ceremonies were July 22 and August 2, 1943. In the book, I wrote these were near the end of runway 11. This re-examines the locations and attendees.

Bergstrom's daughter, Jan, in June 2020 shipped me a box with her dad's photo album with 180 photos. I put 35 of his photos in the June 2020 newsletter. He had 17 photos of an award ceremony but they were blurry and so I did not share them. Now they are they key to the 7/22 ceremony.






The 7/22/43 ceremony is above left, and the mountain has a peak at the red circle which is the same as in the image top left. These are views in the direction of the blue arrow below across what was runway 03. Below is from a panorama of Tontouta Air Base in New Caledonia 10/7/43. The photo above left also shows at the blue circle the roof of the control tower, below right. Bergstrom had the photo above right and the mountain peak is west of our line, roughly from the green arrow.



At left is the arm of Vallely, last in line. In the distance are a mountain, telephone pole, and the roof of the 13<sup>th</sup> Air Depot. The pole is estimated to be that outlined in pink below left, west of a building. The line in pink on the aerial below right is from Vallely, end of the formation, to the pole and depot. Bottom left are high poles, those outlined in aqua above it. The trees below left are also below right. The image at right has an L-shaped building, and this is the orange line direction below right. The 7/22/43 formation was therefore where shown in red.







The formation on the prior page is shown again above. This is 13 officers wearing hats, then enlisted men wearing barracks caps. GO 182 listed 38 officers, numbered at right, in the right column, and the 13 who attended, listed at right, are shown in a front view below.









The left C-47's nose art, above left, seems to Blankinship and Bernard's plane "Sally," at right.














The north C-47 is Bastard, and south one, on the next page, had no name.

GO 183 listed 29 officers, and the 11 above right attended. Some of these received the DFC on 7/22 and wore it to get the Air Medal. Below are a) Remaklus, J. Alexander and J. Bell, b) Blankinship, Block, Abernathy, and Brown, and c) Brown, and the first of the enlisted men, Burden.







GO 183 listed 31 **enlisted men** and the 28 at right, plus 2, attended. Watkins was in a post-awards photo but does not seem to be in line. #24-#27 are not visible in any photos but are assumed to have been here.

Below are a) A.Johnson, DeLoss, and Jurkewicz, b) Kelly and Lach, c) McCullough, d) Meadows, Merriott, Mullin, F. Allen, and Anacker, and e) Powell, Laming, and Ingalls. Laming was on GO 187, 7/22/43. Ingalls is on one of two additional orders, GO 186, as noted on the next page. These two were added at the end.

#### General Orders 184 & 186

GO 184 issued July 19, awarded the AM to Adams, and OLC to Fraser and Baldry. GO 186 issued 7/21 awarded Air Medals or OLCs for: a) the reef landing, b) a Guadalcanal drop mission, and c) finding lifeboats. These were given at these ceremonies.

#### b. 1944-45: Photos from Richard J. McDonough, Radio Operator, 12/7/44-9/23/45

The majority of squadron members took a ship to the South Pacific. A highlight was crossing the equator. The Navy historically celebrated this with a King Neptune Ceremony, inducting men into the Ancient Order of the Deep. The book on page 128 has stories from those who went over in November 1942, and Szafir described men tossed in a tub.

McDonough went over on the USS *Admiralty Islands* with the men at left, and had two photos. Above left, an inductee waltzes for King Neptune between sailors who throw water at his back. Above right, an inductee is about to be tossed into the tub. This ship's deck was wood. The photos' backs had "Official photographs, U.S. Navy," #93 and #99.

McDonough is at right, before the Thirsty 13<sup>th</sup>. He had the photo below left with Clunie in our Biak camp, on the east side of the chapel, estimated with a Japanese gun. Below center he is with Kosovich and I. Cohen holding the Japanese flag which was in the last newsletter.

McDonough flew 17 multi-day missions with us as a radio operator, including to Guadalcanal, and after the surrender perhaps to Tokyo. He is at the blue arrow below right at Biak of 12 of our 40 radio operators.



#### c. 1945: Diary of Norton A. Gunderson, Radar Mechanic, 1/30/45-9/17/45

Gunderson, a Norwegian, born 9/1/1907, grew up on a farm in Minnesota. After high school, he worked putting up poles to bring electricity to western Minnesota. He enlisted in the national guard 6/7/27 for 9 months. On 8/23/1927, when 20 years old, he drove to Minneapolis to see Minnesota-native Lindbergh, on his tour. Fifteen years later at 35, Gunderson enlisted, as shown above, but did not enter active service until 7/5/43, as summarized below by his daughter, Joann.

<u>Date</u> <u>To</u>

- 9/42-3/43 University of North Dakota to study electricity and radio.
- 10/2/42 Enlistment in the Signal Corps Enlisted Reserve Corp.
- 3/43 University of Minnesota for a course in pre-radar.
- 7/5/43 Fort Snelling, Minn., for active duty.
- 7/15/43 Miami Beach, estimated for boot camp.
- 11/8/43 Fort Monmouth, N.J.
- 2/19/44 Camp Murphy, Fl., a top-secret school for radar and Long Wave Detector.
- 6/23/44 Boca Raton, Fl., studied IFF, radio altimeter, homing beacon and Loran.
- 10/25/44 Kearns, Ut, where they checked the skills of men going to the Pacific.
- 11/19/44 Camp Stoneman, Pittsburg, Ca., to await a ship.

#### Gunderson's Description of the Pacific Crossing, with Supplements

Gunderson wrote the following about his Pacific crossing. On 2/23, I found online the diary of Leo Guabello, who went over on the same ship as Gunderson, to our sister squadron, the 63<sup>rd</sup> TCS. I include his notes in light blue to supplement Gunderson's notes.

<u>Gunderson (Radar Mechanic, 1/45-9/45, from Diary):</u> [From Camp Stoneman, in my 2017-11b newsletter.] "Dec 5: alerted for shipment. On way to barge at 9 a.m. Couple mile hike.

"Reach Frisco about 4 p.m. Get aboard SS <u>Cape Mendocino</u> [pictured below, not APA-100], a converted cargo ship, at 5 P.M. Underway at 6 p.m. No escort. About 1400 men aboard.

"Have 2 meals and a lunch each day. Not very good food. Saltwater showers and 2 canteens a day of drinking water. Play cards and read a lot, chief pastimes. Cross the equator on the 16<sup>th</sup>. "Have a torpedo attack on the 19<sup>th</sup>, but luckily escape."

<u>Guabello:</u> "Australian B-34 warned us of sub. A Jap submarine tormented us for a day, but we lost it at nightfall. One of our guns fired at possible torpedo wake. Nothing happened.

"Dec 24: Today we are in the Solomons. Passed & seen Guadalcanal & Tulagi."

"Dec 25: Christmas day, what a way to celebrate it. Do have turkey and all the trimmings, and a gift bag from the Red Cross. Sight our first land."

"Dec 27: A mighty exciting day for all on board. Landed at Finschhafen, New Guinea to leave five officers off. Are now on our way again to Hollandia. (2 days and 2 nights [by ship].)

"Dec 28: In a convoy today. Due to fog last night, we lost the convoy. Skipper kept circling until convoy showed up. A foghorn was heard close-by and a freighter missed us by yards.

"Took another 'rain' shower today. Wonderful to be clean.

"Dec 29: Landed at Hollandia. Waiting our turn to disembark. Must be a hundred merchant vessels docked and anchored with Destroyers by the dozen. Hoping we get off ship tomorrow.

"Dec 30: Spent the day docked in the bay. Still on board, but blackout has ceased. Had a movie on deck at night. Now have reception from the States on the radio. Good music.

"Dec 31: Were taken off *Cape Mendocino* & put on LCI [landing craft infantry] & taken ashore. We (60 men) were taken out here to the airport & are in big six-man tents. Beautiful soft-water showers direct from the [Cyclops mountains]."





In Hollandia Gunderson and Guabello were assigned to the 92<sup>nd</sup> Replacement Depot.

<u>Guabello:</u> "There are a few scattered [Japs] still in the hills. Planes buzz over area 50 feet from the ground, a beautiful sight. The scenery on the island is beautiful. Mountains 7,000 & 8,000 ft. high, with green trees & streams. There's a waterfall up in the [mountains], [dammed] off, and it's a swell swimming hole. The water is pure & cold. I like the place a lot

"Jan 6-27: Baseball and softball team going along swell. Am going to Biak Island to join the 403 Troop Carrier [then the 63<sup>rd</sup> TCS]. A darn good deal. Only delay is air transportation.

"Feb. 1: Flew from Hollandia in a C-47 to the isle of Biak. Wonderful homes, best chow I ever had. The 2-hour plane ride was very thrilling."

Gunderson joined us 1/30/45 at 37 years old per the morning report above right. He is at right, on the right, with Epperhart, who joined the same day, as did Getter (photos from Harriss).

Gunderson wrote notes in a diary every day. Some excerpts:

- 1/30 "Finally Assigned."
- 1/31 "Get settled in new place. Very neat appearing."
- 2/2 "Work on radio sets I studied in school in Boca Raton."
- 3/23 "Received Christmas package."
- 4/8 "Roast beef dinner, first in long time."
- 5/7 "At 11 p.m., news of Germany surrender."
- 6/7 "Made sergeant after 4 months in squadron."
- 8/11 "Awakened at 12:45 a.m., say Japan decided to give up."
- 8/12 "Listen to short wave broadcasts regarding Jap surrender."
- 8/15 "War officially ends, News at 7 a.m. Happy Day."
- 8/17 "Reach Leyte at 1 p.m., stay at new camp, Dulag."
- 8/19 "Rather nice camp area, grass, palm, and banana trees.
- 8/20 "On detail to put up new building for orderly room."

### At Biak, Gunderson had the following, <u>similar to what all</u> 13<sup>th</sup> TCS enlisted men experienced:

- 2 days off per week, eventually Tuesdays and Sundays. He drove around areas of Biak on Sunday 3/25 and Sunday 6/24 with friends who took photos, including that at right.
- A beer ration 2/23, and on 7/14 received 24 cans of beer.
- Guard duty for 6 hours, 1-2 times/mo., as summarized below.
- K.P. duty 3 times/mo, then 2 times, declining to once/mo.:

2/3, 2/15, 2/28, 3/10, 3/16, 4/20, 4/29, 6/11, 7/2, 7/27, 8/13, 9/11.

- Carpenter detail 3/22 and 4/24.
- Garbage-burning detail 4/26.
- Mess supply detail 6/2.
- Detail to start taking down the Biak camp for the move to Dulag on 7/18 and again 7/20.

He also had the movie titles, far right, I did not have before.

Gunderson's role was to adjust, tune, and maintain radar equipment, and teach the air crew how to operate the Loran Navigation Set. His work location was "at the line," i.e., the ramp at the airfield, where he had a shop. His Separation Record said he "Supervised a crew of eight."

His missions included three 1-day trips out and back:

- 3/27 to Morotai to check out pilots on radar set.
- 4/11 to the Admiralties and back, 11 hours, 1800 miles.
- 5/12 a 2-hour night flight, his first time in a C-46. At right and below (from Getter) he is with a C-46.

#### He had two overnight missions:

- 3/29-4/2 to Morotai, where he slept under the airplane wing, then 2 days of 8-hour round trips from Morotai to Samar on Leyte, and an 11-hour round trip to Palawan, then back to Biak 4/1. He noted he received no flying pay for these 5 days, and an estimated 5,000 miles.
- 4/13-4/17 to Morotai; waited 4 days for a flight back.

#### His diary notes also included:

- Air raids 3/22 at 9:15 p.m., 4/4, 7/9, and 7/12 (1.5 hrs).
- Award ceremonies 3/24 and 7/5.
- Basketball vs. the 64<sup>th</sup>: 6/11 won 25-18 (\$10,000 bet on game), 6/12 lost 33-22, 6/14 lost 33-30.
- The funeral on the book's page 694 was 8/1, in the morning I did not have this date.

Guabello's diary entries include a description of a bombing Gunderson also experienced:


"March 24: 2 Japanese planes took whole island [Biak] by surprise by dropping 14 bombs, causing fair damage in warehouse area, C-54 & 2 P-38s burned up. 40 lives taken, 200 wounded. [On the book's page 629.]

"Next few nights many practice alerts were staged. [Anti-aircraft and combat aircraft] outfits moved in very fast for protection of island. Now tonight [April 4] we had 3 blackouts. Two were our own planes with IFF out, the other was unknown. We have to check IFF of our planes and had a lecture on being extra-precautious now that we are in danger. Still unknown where enemy planes came from on night of raid. Probabilities point to Japheld New Guinea or Celebes [near Morotai].

"Japs in hills quieted down. We hold about 1/15 of island [Biak]. After 2 weeks of preparation, we're prepared for anything the J--s have to offer."

The diary's entries are retyped on the following pages. After these is a page with four programs Gunderson saved, that for the first time describe the 403<sup>rd</sup> Group chapel services. Thank you, Norton Gunderson and Joann!


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



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#### **Programs from Four 403rd Troop Carrier Group Chapel Services**

Gunderson had programs from the 403<sup>rd</sup> Group chapel next to our camp in Biak and Dulag.

4/8/45 (left and above left) – The chapel had an organ and an organist. The Chaplain led all in the Lord's prayer. A singer sang a solo. There is an "Invitation Hymn" such as in Baptist churches. Communion was after the service. On the right it states "An informal Evangelical service is held in this chapel each Sunday night at 1900. Following this service, a Bible class is being taught by chaplain DeVore." Midweek services are held each Thursday at 1900. They took a collection each week for missions, and the prior week received \$126.72 (\$1,970 in 2022).

5/30/45 (right and above right) – this is a Memorial Day Service, concluding with "Taps."

**6/24/45** (left and below left) – this has evangelical hymns "All Hail the Power," "Jesus Calls Us," and "Beneath the Cross."








**8/26/45** (below right) – this is after the 13<sup>th</sup> TCS moved to Dulag, and is at an undetermined location. It features a singing quartette of the Managbanag Sisters. Gunderson wrote in his diary "Heard 4 Philippine girls sing. Very good." A solo by Miss Sarah Manabanag. The announcements state communion is still after the service, evening worship is at 7 p.m., and prayer services are Thursdays at 7 p.m.











#### 2. Members and Relatives

#### a. Found Daughter of McDonough

On February 15, while trying to find another photo of Gornbein, I looked at files from people he practiced with at Bergstrom, which included McDonough. In 2017, I contacted McDonough's nephew's daughter, and sent her a book, and thought he had no children of his own. On February 15, I decided to confirm this and found an obit. I was surprised to learn he had two daughters and a son. I called and spoke to one daughter, Kathy. She had no idea about my research and was happy to get the information I sent her, e.g., PDFs of pages from the book. I emailed Kathy the image of twelve men on page 6, and she was happy to identify her dad in the middle of the group.

On February 17, as I went over the items of Cohen for the last newsletter, he had signatures on currency of just five men, and one was McDonough. I emailed this to Kathy. On February 19, Kathy emailed me photos of her dad's photos, and one of these, on page 6 herein, showed Cohen holding the Japanese flag, the flag I had held on February 6, 13 days before. Kathy was great to mail me her 8 originals for me to scan and included two orders. Both had Abramowitz from the last newsletter. These were three surprising and fun coincidences.

#### b. Good Photo of Irwin Cohen at Biak

On March 1, after sending out the newsletter, while speaking to Joann Gunderson, she mentioned she had an "I surrender" pamphlet for the Japanese to give us. I had seen this before from Harriss and looked at his files. I found many photos of men with a Japanese flag, and it was the one in the last newsletter which Irwin Cohen had. I realized the photo at right is Cohen with this flag, inset. This is in front of around tent A9 at Biak (the colorization should have made the flag center red). I was happy to find a good photo of Cohen. He turned 20 years old on 2/16/45.

#### 3. Conclusions and Thanks

The squadron history advanced, yet again. Thank you to Bergstrom's daughter for in 2020 sharing her dad's photos of the 7/22/43 award ceremony.

A big thank you to Block's son John, who, after I emailed him March 2 asking if I could get higher resolution scans of his two photos of the 8/2/43 ceremony on page 4, went right away and spent \$27 to overnight these to me. They were key to figuring out the 8/2/43 ceremony.

Thank you to Kathy McDonough and Joann Gunderson for each sharing their dads' fantastic items.
